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STEM Storybook selection criteria	
Diversity and Inclusion	
There are no stereotype and misrepresentation prompted in the story	
Diverse characters (e.g., characters with disabilities or characters of color; male/female) are positively represented in the book.	1
f diverse characters were portrayed in the book, they were identified as a positive and constructive ole model or have leadership and action roles.	
here are no offensive or harmful words to individuals with disabilities or diverse population	
STEM content	
Storybook provides an accurate STEM idea/concepts that can be expanded on through conversation; I all possible STEMconcepts	ist
he story incorporates different STEM vocabularies; list STEM vocabularies used	
he story can make connections with children's own experiences	
The story can promote STEM learning and process	
s STEM content developmentally appropriate or align with standards	
Dialogic Reading/storybook conversation/shared book reading	
The book is appropriate and appealing for young children (content, length, vocabularies)	
The book has potential for STEM conversations/discussions	
Other strengths of story/book
